NINETY-EIGHT AND STILL YOUNG.

INTERVIEW WITH REV. CHARLES GREEN.

WRITING A BOOK ON SPIRITUALISM.

Ninety-eight years old last Thursday, the Rev. Charles Green of St. Carow-road, Eastbourne, has made a discovery. He verily believes he is growing old. And to prove it he points to having had to give up his annual birthday walk to Beachy Head, which he kept up until a year or two ago. Further, long walks alone are forbidden him, largely owing to the age, but he is able to give a stout stick for support. Another sign of age, he says, is that his memory is not so good as it was!

Great questions like Capitalism and Labor still agitate his thoughtful mind, and although he tells himself that these things won't be solved in his lifetime and that he ought not to bother about them yet it is difficult to renounce them entirely.

Theologian and Biblical critic are among his favourite studies, and he is especially keen about spiritualism, upon which subjects he reads a school paper to the clergy of the town a few years ago. Since then he has pursued the subject further with particular reference to the point "Are there real communications with the dead?" He has quite a little library on the subject and has almost finished a book of his own upon it.

Other recent literary efforts include a letter to the "Times" in regard to the "Primate" and two articles on "British Weekly" on "Memories of Spurgeon" and "Memories of Spurgeon."

When the interviewer said he hoped he was not tiring Mr. Green, the latter replied that he was never tired of talking. He likened himself to a sparrow on the homestead, and declared that if his talks were capable of robbing a man of sleep, he would read a school paper to the clergy of the town a few years ago.

Yet this is the man whose interest in public affairs is unabated, who is a ready conversationalist, writes his own letters, contributes occasionally to the "Times," "British Weekly" and other papers, and is even now writing a book on spiritualism. (His own words: "A real physical collapse.") (Another phrase of his). The general public will know what value to place upon statements like these. Now if he had called himself Peter Pan he would have been nearer the mark. Why, his spirit is so young that he has to check himself from doing too much; and if he comes to see the banks others here to do it for him, he should wear himself out. Old, forthwith!

KEEPING UPRIGHT.
 A representative of the "Eastbourne Chronicle" who was recently favoured with an interview found this remarkable gentleman looking very well, his complexion clear and smooth, his hair white and still luxuriant. True, his back has lost some of its old military crispness, and he is jokingly confessed that he is having some difficulty in keeping his balance. There is not an hour of the day now that he is not realising that, and he pointed to his walking stick which was close at hand in case of emergency.

He also mentioned that he had had a couple of falls—one in the street and the other at home.
